

Lion Townsend joined our club in May 2024 and has truly revitalized the eyeglass collection efforts in Casper. He has installed a drive-up drop box on Country Club Road, near the intersection of 12th Street and Country Club Road. To his surprise, this drop box has received many donations, all without any publicity other than word of mouth.

Additionally, he has set up collection boxes at various ophthalmology and optometry offices. One of his unique strategies involves visiting different churches in the area and asking if he can place a collection box in the foyer for a few Sundays. He also requests that the staff announce the initiative at the end of services, encouraging congregants to bring their old eyeglasses over the next two Sundays. In one instance, he was invited to explain the Lions of Wyoming program during a service.

Lion Townsend has expressed how much he enjoys getting out into the community and meeting new people around the city.

Cheyenne Sunrise Lions Club

One of the ongoing projects of the Sunrise Lions Club is the vision screening of pre-school-aged children. From September through November of 2024, the club has visited 6 locations in Cheyenne to test the vision of children. Using a PlusOptix screening camera, one of the Lions takes a photo of the child's eyes. The camera analyzes the eyes and gives a Pass/Refer rating. The parents of a child with a Refer rating are given a referral report to give to their eyecare professional for further evaluation. So far this school year, we have screened 142 children and referred 6 of them. The average age of the kiddos is about 4 years old. Most of our club's screeners are retired educators who realize the importance of a child having good vision before learning to read.


In addition to screening the vision of the children, we provide each of the students at the facility with a small age-appropriate paperback book for them to take home. Our Literacy Project has handed out several thousand books to children over the last decade.

More day care and pre-school screenings are being scheduled for after the first of the year, including a screening to assist the Pine Bluffs Lions Club at a day care facility in their community.

Support for the screenings and the book donations comes from the club's annual Ride for Sight event, held each August.

Laramie Plains Lions Club

The Laramie Plains Lions Club (LPCI) celebrate their Charter Day (9 April 1965). The LPCI was sponsored by the Laramie Lions Club (Chartered 1920). Lion Clint Harris has been a Lion the longest of members, starting with the LPLCI in 1973, transferring to Mountain View Lions, then to Evanston Lions, and back to LPLCI. However, Lion Lew Lyon has the longest continuous longevi-



ty membership in the club. When asked when he became a Lion he said he could not answer since the Lions motto of Service to Others has applied to him forever. His first impression of Club membership was not favorable as his experience with a clubs' members using the facilities that he worked at in the early seventy's spent more time in the bar living from paycheck to paycheck. In the spring of 1983 Lion Calvin VanZee invited Lew to attend a meeting of the Laramie Plains Lions Club for breakfast. Those club members were primarily educators and a few businessmen who had to work during the day. Therefore, they got down to club business quickly. Fund raising and projects were done on weekends. At the time there were three Lions Clubs (Laramie Lions, Laramie Plains, an Evening Club) and the Gem City Lioness Club. In 1983 the primary fund raising project was selling firewood. Charter member Lion Crede Wheat would take his draft horses to the mountains, drag logs to his semi, and haul the timber to Lion Dick Strom's ranch to be stored, cut, and split. In 1992 the LPLCI partnered with the Laramie Chamber Ag Committee starting the Annual Ice Fishing Derby splitting proceeds. In all those years only one time was the Derby canceled due to lack of ice. Once the Laramie Chamber Ag Committee dissolved, the LPLCI continued to host the Derby with the 2024 Derby being our 31st successful fund raising event. Our club supports the Albany County Fair Youth Awards, Recycling Eyeglasses. Lions Sight Conservation, Downtown Health Clinic at the local level. At District 15 (State of Wyoming) level we support the Allen H. Stewart Lions Camp and the Lions of Wyoming Foundation. At the Regional/National level we support the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Bank, the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Institute Foundation, Leader Dogs for the Blind, Lions Clubs International Foundation.

To ensure that our marketing efforts are successful, we must demonstrate the impact of these funds. If your event has been held before, you'll need to provide a comparison of attendance numbers between the current event and previous ones to show the effectiveness of the marketing.

This is an exciting opportunity for all of us to shine a light on the remarkable work Lions do and to invite more people to join our cause. Together, we can grow stronger and continue serving our communities with even greater impact.

Wyoming Lions Club's, Don't Miss the Opportunity! Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Bank Eye Surgery Grant



In the past year the Lions Clubs from Sheridan County have had the opportunity to help with 5 eye surgeries. The surgeries have been for people that were unable to pay for their service, because they didn't have insurance to pay for all of the cost, and/or the means to pay.

These surgeries have been paid for by a joint effort between the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Bank (RMLEB) Eye Surgery Fund Grant, 80%, Lions of Wyoming Foundation Grant, 10% and the 3 Lion Clubs in Sheridan County, 10%, Big Horn

Lions Club, Sheridan Sundowners Lions Club and the Story Lions Club.

The Lion Clubs from Sheridan County joined together in 1988 to pay for corneal transplants in both eyes, for an individual that did not have the ability pay or insurance. This was long before any help was available from the RMLEB Surgery Fund and the Lions of Wyoming Foundation. The Clubs still pay equal amounts regardless which Club applies for the Eye Surgery Grant.

Please go to the RMLEB website at https://corneas.com, click on Lions and then Eye Surgery Grant. You can then print everything, including instructions, application and verification. When that is done, please read the instructions and then read them again to make sure nothing was missed in the 1st reading. A couple of things you must remember are to get the application into the RMLEB office no later than the last day of the month before the Board of Directors meet. Look for this information in the instructions. This gives them time to ask any questions they may have before the Board meets and secondly, the grant application must be approved before the surgery is performed. They will notify you of the decision the week after the Board meets.

The application is a 5 page form and make sure everything is filled out and signed by everyone, Patient, Doctor and the Lion from the sponsoring Lions Club.

I have found that if you have any questions, staff at the Doctors Office may be able to help or call the RMLEB at 720-848-3937 or 800-444-7479.



Good afternoon,

Over the past several months, a number of our partners in the donation process have been contacted by reporters regarding former eye bank employees and our organization. This has resulted in some negative media coverage recently on tissue and organ donation, including an article on the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Bank.

First, let's be clear that Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Bank (RMLEB) is not under any kind of investigation and continues to maintain its accreditation with the Eye Bank Association of America (EBAA). We provided information to these reporters to help readers understand the importance of our work, the guidelines and policies followed to ensure our processes are to the highest standard, data to give context, and RMLEB shared stories of hope from our valuable donors and corneal transplant recipients. Much of this information was not included in the article. Additionally, we have updated our Frequently Asked Questions to further provide transparency and awareness: https://corneas.org/Donation-FAQ.

We are disappointed in the negative focus of this piece, which relies on the perspectives of several former RMLEB employees who have not been with our organization for multiple years. RMLEB, like most organizations, does not publicly comment on personnel issues. Nor do we discuss specific donations as a matter of privacy to donor families.

The former employees interviewed in this article do not represent our present-day workforce. We proudly continue to strengthen our culture and make RMLEB a great place to work. Because you are a trusted partner, we'd like to share a few of the many steps we are taking to prioritize culture: implementing new employee feedback structures, including one-to-one meetings with supervisors three times per year and 360 reviews; utilizing the Culture Index in our hiring process and employee development; and incorporating the organizational vision into our daily processes. Many of these activities are based on exit interview feedback, including input we received from the former employees interviewed for the article.

Again, beyond our own internal policies, control levels and best practices for national eye banking standards, we follow strict guidelines set by regulating agencies, including the EBAA and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA).
